

Ten THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT VOTING IN WISCONSIN

1. Even-numbered years have elections in February, April, August and November. Odd years have elections in February and April.

2. You are eligible to vote if you are at least 18 years old, a US citizen, a resident of Wisconsin, and not serving a felony sentence.

3. Register to vote, find your polling place, view a sample ballot, and update your registration at [MyVote.Wi.Gov](https://www.MyVote.Wi.Gov).

4. Voters who vote in every election have a say in healthcare, schools, taxes, roads, transit, courts, job programs, parks, housing, food assistance, and clean air and water.

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5. You can learn about the candidates at Vote411.org.

6. Voter intimidation is against the law. If you feel something is wrong at the polls, ask for the Chief Election Inspector.

7. Voters must show an ID. For a list of acceptable IDs, visit BringIt.Wi.Gov.

8. You have three ways to vote: absentee ballot by mail, early voting, and voting at the polls on Election Day. It's your choice!

9. It's OK to ask another person to help you read your ballot.
